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New Leaders Elected At 1998 Rally

Both International and U.S. Canada leaders were elected at the 1998 Clan Egan gathering held at Annapolis, Maryland, June 19–22, 1998. The death of Michael J. Egan of Castlebar left the Clan Egan without an elected Chieftain. Michael J.S. Egan of Dublin was elected Clan Chieftain by acclamation. He has shown dedication and leadership abilities over a period of time that made him the outstanding choice as the International Clan Chieftain. He was nominated and then elected by acclamation. Eithne Egan, widow of Michael J., presented him with the lunala and gavel, the symbols of his office.

A Good Time Was Had By All

Saint John's College in Annapolis, Maryland definitely was the place to be June 19–22 if you wanted a good time with fine people. The 1998 Gathering of the Clan Egan was the event and there were many Egans, Eagans, Eagans, Eagans et al and their families in attendance. At the banquet there were one hundred, seventy of us in one room.

Friday evening, Michael Maloney, cultural attaché from the Embassy of Ireland, addressed the group on the status and goals of the peace process. He spoke of three levels of activity: (1) neighborhood to neighborhood in Northern Ireland, (2) Community in Northern Ireland to community in the Republic of Ireland, (3) The Republic of Ireland and England. U.S. Senator George Mitchell was praised highly as the leader in the process. President Clinton received accolades also. He said that few people realized that on the night of Good Friday Clinton was on the telephone at three in the morning EST persuading participants to remain at the table and not to give up on the meetings. Mr. Maloney also answered questions from the group for many of us. Ireland can be proud to have him as a spokesman.

Pat Colling Egan gave a slide presentation of some of her research in which she presented a different theory about the location of some of the early Egans. It is serious food for thought. I admit I cannot do it justice in this column.

Saturday was a busy and important day. We all gathered and Vince Egan, Director of Development presided over the meeting. The Mayor of Annapolis welcomed us and expressed his joy in having our group in his beautiful and historic city. Father Joe Egan opened it with a prayer and paid a tribute to deceased Clan Chieftain Michael J. Egan and others who had passed on. Michael J.'s wife, Eithne and daughter, Mary Kaye were introduced. After the nomination and election by acclamation of Michael J.S. Egan, Eithne came forward and placed the lunala on the new Chieftain. She also presented the gavel to him. This was a very emotional moment and one of grace and dignity. His acceptance was brief, but he spoke of looking to the future and the importance of communication in our organization. Keeping in mind we do not have a large treasury and postage costs are high, electronic communication appears to be preferred when possible. Almost everyone present either has e-mail or has someone in his or her family who can send and receive on their behalf.

Two programs were presented in the afternoon, Irish Genealogy by Pam Clark of the Irish Acorn and Jim McInerney who related to us the role of the Irish Brigade in the Civil War. He told of the heroism and great losses suffered by the Fughting 69th at the Antietam Battlefield and the monument recently placed there in their honor.

Saturday evening we enjoyed a banquet and had several distinguished guests, the Mayor of Wexford, his wife, and the Wexford County Manager. Wexford, Ireland and Annapolis are sister cities and thus the visiting Mayor. The Commodore Barry Unit of the Anciesnt Order of Hibernians was the host for the visiting officials and joined in the fun at the banquet. The AOH presented the Planning Committee and our new Chieftain with several lovely gifts. Following the meal we enjoyed a performance of Irish dancing from the Broesler School of Irish Dance. The performers had competed in Ireland in April and were preparing for the nationals in the United States. The Flying Cows of Ventry provided music the rest of the evening. Several Egans joined in the jigs and reels.

Sunday we visited the birthplace of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, the only Catholic to sign the Declaration of Independence, and then worshiped at St. Mary's Church. The Ancient Order of Hibernians escorted us into the church with an honor guard and piper. The other worshippers were a little surprised. They were even more surprised when they realized that this whole troop of people filed into the pews. It was standing room only. Father John Egan and Father Joe Egan were concelebrants. The soloist was outstanding.

One of the most enjoyable times was the crab feast. It was fun for everyone, those who did and didn't know how to eat the Chesapeake blue crabs. After going inside for cake and coffee we were enchanted by a storyteller. Three little girls assisted him and came in right on cue. Several of our group then shared their favorite family stories. The election of the United States Clan was completed and Byron Egan of Dallas, Texas became the new leader.

Monday morning we boarded buses for tours. Some went to Washington to the National Archives and Mall area. The second bus visited Whitemarsh Chapel where John Carroll was elected the first Bishop of the Catholic Church in the United States, then on to his birthplace and finally to the Basillica of the Immaculate Conception of Mary.

Monday evening was very special. We sat out under the trees on this balmy moonlit night and chatted with each other. Acquaintances became friends. Different ones volunteered to be on committees and ideas were explored. I don't know if it was the magic of the Irish or because it was a group of very fine people, but it was a most enjoyable evening and a wonderful closing to a great weekend.

Meet Byron Egan, President

U.S.A. Canada Clan Egan Association

Nancy and Byron Egan are both Texas natives and live in Dallas, Texas. Byron is a prominent corporate lawyer in large firm there. He and Nancy have been married 32 years and have three daughters, Elizabeth, Katherine and Mary. At the Clan Rally in Ireland in 1996 he met Robert Egan of Downey, California who had traced his family back to 1804 in Ireland. His great-grandfather, Michael Egan came to the U.S. through the port of New York in 1855 when he was 25. Robert Egan is descended from Michael Egan's brother, James, who came to the United States in 1847.

While in Dublin for an American Bar Association meeting in 1985, Byron and his family traveled to Tripperary to look for Egans. They found that County Tripperary is to Ireland as Texas is to the United States and that the town of Tripperary had no Egans. He did, however, find a few Egan listings elsewhere in a national directory. The first Egan he was able to reach was Chief Michael J. Egan at his home in Castlebar. Graciously, he invited them to meet him at his office at the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, Rhodes and Malta in Dublin. Michael was both a practicing lawyer and president of part of that Christian order. Michael J. and his office were imposing. He told Byron that all Egans were from the same line and were equal. Byron saw a family crest on the wall and inquired if it were also his. Michael's response was an explanation of heraldry, which clarified that some Egans were more equal than others in such matters.

Michael J. told him of his acquisition and restoration of Redwood Castle and invited them to visit it, which they did the next day. Looking out from Redwood Castle, Byron had sense of *deja-vu*, a sense that he was on the same soil as his ancestors had walked on centuries before, which was especially moving since his wife and children were there to share the experience.

Michael J. put him in touch with Michael J.S. Egan, who has succeeded Michael J. as our worldwide Chief. Michael J.S. came to their hotel, told him more about the Clan Egan Association and signed up the family. A series of rallies (Ireland, Austria, Salt Lake City, and Annapolis) have ensued and friendships have developed.

Through the Clan he has learned to appreciate his Irish heritage. He has found that genealogy is a humbling and frustrating experience which is full of false trails, but that the bigger picture one gets from the search may be as significant as the details.

He is looking forward to seeing even more Clan people at the Rally in Ireland now planned for June 2000 and working with Clanspeople on Clan matters in the interim.

On the CONTACTS page you will find email addresses of all Clan Officers and links to personal home pages devoted to MacAodhagin Genealogy.
